### Greetings!

It's hard to believe I'm writing a newsletter article for April that is talking about the Easter SEASON and not specifically Easter Sunday. Throughout the next two months we will be in the season of Easter, a season that focuses on what happened after the resurrection. And it fits so well with our next sermon series "Living in a Postresurrection World." Humanity has been living in this postresurrection world for generations, but it's always a good idea to revisit what it means to have faith in the resurrected Christ.

One of the central messages of the Christian faith that is most often overlooked is that Christ is present in and through all things, which means that everything is sacred and every moment is holy. From Easter to Pentecost, we will explore the good news that Christ is risen—not just physically from the grave some two thousand years ago but in every aspect of our lives and world—and how to live in awe of the mundane moments of our ordinary lives. This series begins with focusing on the resurrection of Jesus, a single person, and leads us to Pentecost, where we understand the way in which the entire faith community and indeed the world is resurrected in the Spirit of Christ.

When we speak about the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, in a way we're speaking about three different expressions of Jesus. There is obviously much for us to learn from the living Jesus, the dying Jesus impacts the whole cosmos, and the resurrected Jesus has even more to share with humanity about how we are to continue his message and impact into our world today.

In seminary we discussed quite often about the fact that we're in what scholars call the Postmodern Era and how that affects the church. Add post-Covid onto that title as well and we live in the Trinity of our society in a sense. Humanity has been in the postresurrection world for thousands of years, postmodern for just a few generations, and of course post-Covid for less than 5 years. And along that timeline the church has had to morph and change to meet the needs of society at that time. Let us dig in together during worship to hear how the Spirit is calling us to live into this "Post-Trinity" age.

One of the opportunities you have as a member of the Minneapolis Area Synod is to be a part of the process of electing our next synodical bishop. While Bob Anderson and Beverly Ramey are two of the official voting members at synod assembly this spring, you are welcome to attend one of the candidate forums being held around the cities and see what sort of candidates we have for the position - and you can share your thoughts with your congregational voting members!

The one closest to us will be held Sunday, April 7th from 2:00pm-4:30pm at Our Saviour's Lutheran Church (19001 Jackson St NE, East Bethel, MN). There will also be a Zoom forum held on Tuesday, April 16th from 7:00pm-8:30pm. The Spirit is still active in our world and churches today, and this is one opportunity for us to experience it first hand through the Bishop's Election Process. I hope you can join me that afternoon in East Bethel to see which leaders the Spirit is working through right now!

Last year the Stewardship Committee took steps to try and help members focus on their financial contributions to the church and beyond. After discussing the results from our listening sessions held in February, the committee has decided to highlight the ministry areas of our congregation for folks to not only become more informed about what happens around Salem, but also to see if there are ways that they can use their time and talents to impact those ministries. Over the next six months in the newsletter we will highlight a ministry focus you can get more involved in if you have the time and talents to do so.

The committee thought it would make the most sense to start with the Worship & Music Committee since that is where the most amount of visible ministry is happening at this time. While there isn't an official "committee" in place right now, Donovan Erickson is the council representative over this ministry area.

Altar Guild, a sub-committee within the area, helps weekly to make sure that the paraments and banners match the season as well as set up for weekly communion. Annie Johnson is the current leader of that group and she can help answer questions for those interested in adding their time to the group.

As you probably know, we currently have two part-time musicians who help lead worship throughout the month, and a few substitute musicians for special services and emergency music needs. There have been requests for more special music performances or other types of music during worship, and W&M leadership is open to that opportunity. It would be helpful to have a volunteer in charge of arranging those performances/worship opportunities — so if that is something you may have gifts for, please talk to Pr. Mary or Donovan.

Some other ways you can assist with worship would be to volunteer to usher and/or read during worship. Many of you are already great at welcoming folks to church on a Sunday - why not do it on an "official" level? Reading scripture during worship can be seen as a nerve-wracking thing, but it's worth giving it a try at least once. It's not something that has to be perfect, there is grace for mistakes, and we'd love to have more people to call up and schedule.

When people think about church they think about worship. Stewardship Committee would love for you to think about how you could add your gifts to worship here at Salem!

### St. Basil Soup

### Ingredients:

6 tablespoons of oil of your choice

1 large onion sliced

1/2 lb mushrooms, sliced

- 2 celery stalks, sliced
- 3 2 carrots, sliced
- 4 2 quarts of water
- 5 2 bouillon cubes of your choice
- 6 Salt and pepper to taste
- 7 Chopped parsley
- 8 (I've been know to add white beans as well.)



### Directions:

- 1. Wash and slice the veggies
- 2. 2. Pour oil into soup pot. Add the veggies and sauté for 2-3 minutes, stirring constantly
- 3. Add the water and bouillon cubes. Cook the soup slowly in a covered pot over low heat for 30 minutes. Add salt and pepper and chopped parsley. Simmer the soup for ten minutes and serve hot.

### Transition..... transition!

Hopefully you read that title with the famous melody from Fiddler on the Roof, "Tradition!" in your mind! Yes, it is the season of graduations and entrance ceremonies. As my older daughter recently remarked, "Japanese people sure love their ceremonies!" Along with the ceremonies often come traditions. Some of the traditions are well-documented, and other traditions continue despite the original reasoning being lost to the sands of time.

One cute example of a more recent Japanese tradition is that of giving KitKat candy bars to students who are taking their entrance exams. Japan has a phenomenal range of KitKat flavors, and I think that instead of trying to explain this in words, I'll share a video that explodes with the colors and vitality of the humble KitKat (and why it has become a tradition at entrance exam time). <a href="https://fb.watch/qB6cQ736zV/">https://fb.watch/qB6cQ736zV/</a>]

Traditions are usually thought of as helping people or groups to marking time. Annual events or seasons occur and we pause to reflect on the growth that has occurred in between. It might be just as plausible to think of traditions as marking transitions. We never really experience the traditions in the same way every time. Because of growth, loss, maturation, new vantage points, experiences, or just the inevitable circumstance of aging, a holiday tradition or birthday tradition never feels exactly the same from year to year. My Lenten journey has been different every year, even though the number of days has remained the same and it has always culminated with Easter. We are ever evolving. Transitioning.

When Lutheran missionary Martha Akard established the girls' high school here in Kumamoto in 1926 (98 years ago), I don't know that she could've ever imagined that one day, almost a century later, that these grounds would also be

the educational home of a nursery school, a kindergarten, a junior high, a senior high, a college, and a graduate school. When Patrick and I came in 2006 (80 years after Martha Akard established the school), we never would've imagined that in our lifetime we would see the establishment of an international school in Kumamoto or an elementary school on our campus! Both of those things are being realized this coming school year, which starts on April 1, 2024. Today, we held the dedication ceremony for the building in which the Kyushu Lutheran International Primary School will be housed. We welcomed new teachers and staff members from South Africa, the Philippines, Scotland, China, and elsewhere in Japan to Kumamoto. These folks have committed to bringing our Lutheran mission to a new generation of children in Kumamoto, and for that, we can praise God.



Still under construction and renovation, this is a front view of what will be the Kyushu Lutheran International Primary School. It is expected that grades 1-6 will each have about 20 students in each class. Students will represent a variety of cultural and citizen backgrounds, including Taiwan, France, Japan, the U.S., and others.



In this picture, Uchimura-sensei—a longtime faithful servant in the Japanese Lutheran Church (left)—and President Matsumoto (right) ceremoniously ad the last few scoops of dirt to the newly planted olive tree outside of the elementary school. The school motto will be the same as it is for the other Lutheran schools on the campus, which is 「感恩奉仕」 or Gratitude and Service.

Please join us in prayer in these coming weeks that the Lord will guide the hearts and minds of teachers and staff as they build this new educational and spiritual community.
